

# TIMELINES

## LIFE of ABRAHAM

Considered the Father of the Nation of Israel and the first of the Great Patriarchs, Abraham's life is chronicled over 14 chapters of Genesis. His story of faith is among the first half-dozen post-flood, or post-flood, stories in the Bible—beginning just after the story of the Tower of Babel.

Familiar Bible stories that transpired during his life include the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah, the birth of Isaac when Abraham was 100 years old, and Abraham's faith shown in his attempt to sacrifice Isaac. Abraham lived around 2000 BC and died at age 175. Eventually, the post-flood atmosphere would not support the long lifespans seen in the antediluvian era. Over several centuries, human lifespans began to diminish.





## LIFE of JOSEPH

Joseph, son of Jacob, is not actually considered a patriarch. Number 11 of Jacob's 12 children, Joseph plays a special role in how the nation came to be in Egypt at the time of the Exodus. Joseph was his father's favorite and there was great jealousy among his older brothers, who sold him into slavery. They then told their father Joseph had been killed by a wild animal.

During a great famine, the brothers went to Egypt for food, not realizing their brother Joseph had managed to ascend to the second-in-command, leading for him to precede his brothers there. Joseph was forgiving, saying it was God's will and was able to reunite with his father before his death.

Joseph's bones were taken on the Exodus around 450 years after his birth and reburied in Shechem in Israel. A tomb was recently unearthed there—possibly the place he was reinterred.



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

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


# LIVES of ISAAC & JACOB

Isaac and his son Jacob are the other two Great Patriarchs of Israel (along with Abraham). As only four chapters in Genesis cover Isaac's life before Jacob's birth, their recorded history is mostly intertwined.

The most noteworthy stories concerning Isaac are his birth—as his parents were 90 and 100 years old at the time—and Abraham's show of faith as he began to sacrifice Isaac.

Jacob has many more colorful adventures, and his name actually becomes "Israel," as he is the father of the first generation of the 12 tribes.



# LIFE of JOSEPH

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During a great famine, the brothers went to Egypt for food, not realizing their brother Joseph had managed to ascend to the second-in-command, leading alongside Potiphar and Pharaoh. Joseph was forgiving, saying it was God's will for him to precede his brothers there. He provided for all his brothers and their children, and was able to reunite with his father before his death.


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# BACKGROUND to the EXODUS & EARLY EXODUS

Most biblical accounts of the Exodus cover either the background and the beginning— (which took place in 1446-1445 BC) or the end of the 40-year journey (which occurred in 1406 BC). Little is written about the 38 years in between.

This timeline covers the background and first year of the Exodus. The period ends with the people murmuring about the spies' report, outlined in Numbers 13. The people had seen spectacular miracles, beginning with the 10 plagues of Egypt.




# MIDDLE & LATE EXODUS

The Book of Numbers records a bit of history halfway through the 40-year Exodus, and this story is one that is not as well known.

An uprising was sparked by a Levite named Korah. It came to a head with 250 well-respected followers turning on Moses for acting above (or “holier than thou”) the others in the camp. Eventually Moses called a meeting to address their insolence, where Korah’s gang and their families disappeared into a strange sinkhole. The 250 followers were burned to death by a fire from heaven, and 14,000 dissenters died in a plague.

The following day, Aaron’s staff budded and produced almonds. Moses put it in front of the Ark of the Covenant as a reminder to the people that rebellion is divisive.

Deuteronomy picks up where Numbers leaves off. This timeline does not contain records and statutes — only historic events.



# THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

This timeline is special for two reasons: (1) Few researchers have attempted to cross-reference Exodus and Deuteronomy to get a complete picture, and (2) there are many misconceptions about the acquisition of the Ten Commandments.

For example, many people think that only Moses heard God's voice on the top of Mount Sinai. In actuality, the entire camp heard God giving the Ten Commandments. This makes it even more absurd that the people in the base camp made a golden calf idol less than 30 days later. They heard the voice of God aloud, something we will likely never hear in our lifetime on earth, and yet they behaved in this horrible manner. No wonder God was angry in the Old Testament.


Another common misconception is that Moses climbed Mount Sinai once, spoke with God, and came down with the Commandments. In reality, he made three trips to the summit of Mount Sinai, spending 40 days at the top twice, and God wrote the Ten Commandments twice. Here is a compilation of Exodus 19-32 and Deuteronomy 5 & 9, which cover the events as Moses records them.

# THE LIFE OF SAMUEL

Samuel was a very special prophet as well as the final judge of Israel. As judge, he was present when the Israelites said they wanted a king. He delivered the message from God that it would not end well—a famous passage and one that is certainly still relevant surrounding modern politics. Samuel died shortly before King Saul, and his spirit appears in the Bible’s only “ghostly tale.”


Here’s a timeline of Samuel’s great stories:



# EARLY LIFE OF KING DAVID

King David was the most popular king of Israel, whom the Lord called “a man after my own heart” (1 Samuel 13:14, Acts 13:22). The Bible contains great details of his chronology. David was secretly anointed by Samuel as king of Israel, while Saul was still reigning. Yet approximately 13 years passed until David actually ascended to the throne, and those times were full of misadventures: running from King Saul, sparing the king’s life twice, and colluding with the Philistines from whom Goliath had come.

This is the life of King David prior to assuming the throne. With no biblical mention of his birth, scholars estimate he was born around 1041 BC in Bethlehem.




# KINGSHIP of KING DAVID

David reigned for 40 years, from the age of 30 until he died at age 70 (970 BC). As king, he experienced great relief from the hardships of his late teens and 20s. However, he still had problems. He remained a warrior for seven years. As if he didn't know what to do with peace when it finally came, he became involved with a married woman, Bathsheba, which invoked a big scandal and cost lives. In his later years, one of David's sons raped a half-sister and was murdered by a second son. That son created a coup d'état and wound up being killed by David's own soldiers.

The good that came from all of the turmoil?

David and Bathsheba bore and raised Solomon, who became the next king.




# KING SOLOMON (1001 BC — 931 BC)

King Solomon, son of King David and Bathsheba, came to the throne at the age of 30 and reigned over the united kingdom for 40 years, just like his father.

Solomon is known for his wisdom, which came to him from God. Through prayer, God offered Solomon anything for which he asked. He asked for wisdom to rule the people. God was pleased that he did not ask for power, wealth, or long life and responded that he would give Solomon all of these things along with wisdom. Solomon was said to be the richest man in the world, as well as the wisest.

Solomon did build the long-awaited Temple after his father David was told by God that he had too much blood on his hands from his many battles. However, toward the end of Solomon's life he diverged into idolatry, allowing himself to be influenced by his many pagan wives.

Solomon's life plays out in the first half of 1 Kings and also in 2 Chronicles.



# KINGS OF THE DIVIDED KINGDOM

## 951 BC-586 BC ISRAEL & JUDAH

When Samuel resided as judge, the people declared they wanted a king instead of God. God gave the people their desire, along with a warning, and so began the Era of the Kings. Kings Saul, David, and Solomon were the kings of a united kingdom. In 1 Kings 11:10-12, the Lord rebukes Solomon for getting carried into idolatry by his many pagan wives. The text reads as follows:

*Although He had warned Solomon explicitly not to follow other gods, Solomon did not keep the LORD's command. Then the LORD said to Solomon, "Because you have done this and have not kept My covenant and My statutes, which I have commanded you, I will tear the kingdom away from you and give it to your servant. Nevertheless, for the sake of your father David, I will not do it during your lifetime; I will tear it out of the hand of your son..."*

Solomon's son Rehoboam did not take the advice of elders, but rather looked to his own peer group concerning the issue of taxes. Solomon had built the Temple and many public parks, taxing the people heavily. Upon his death, they asked for a lighter tax burden. Rehoboam not only denied them, but did so insolently in a speech. It split the kingdom at the beginning of his reign.

The tribe of Benjamin stayed with the tribe of Judah to form the nation of Judah. The other 10 tribes split away, with Jeroboam as their king. Judah kept Jerusalem, so the other tribes made Samaria their capital and worshipped there. The Era of the Kings was mostly terrible for both kingdoms, with only a few kings biblically defined as good kings. All the good kings were from Judah:

The Era of the Kings ended in 586 BC with the invasion of Babylon & the Great Exile.

722 BC: The Assyrians invade Israel, take all the people captive, and disperse them among the nations. The Ten Tribes of Israel are lost to this day.


# BOOK of ACTS

The Book of Acts is the last history book of the Bible. It is not a complete account of the Apostles' lives, covering only the period from the Ascension until shortly after 60 AD and focusing on Peter and Paul.

Chapters 1-12 primarily follow Peter until his belief in preaching to the Gentiles is fulfilled. Chapters 13-28 primarily follow Paul and his missionary journeys far and wide. The book ends before either man is martyred for the faith, which is why it is dated in the early 60s AD.




